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A seventeen year old girl is scrolling through Twitter and reads, "On October 17, 2017, at age 95, Betty White is found dead in her home." Her immediate gut reaction is to believe it.

Thoughts are flowing through her head, causing her to think, "Well she's old, of course she died." The same thing happened to me, but a little while back. After having confidence that the tweet was real, I later found out that Betty White was indeed, still alive, and that I had become a victim of this thing called "fake news." Fake news is news that is reported via television, newspaper, internet, or social media that is fictitious, or in other words, untrue. It is everywhere and only progressing. Some of the negative effects include destroying transparency, increasing the political gap, and consistently being spread around the globe.

Fake news annihilates transparency. Propaganda and made-up news stories are being spread daily. These unreliable sources have taken away from everything people believe to be true. "Many of the early, optimistic assumptions about how the internet would create a public sphere with greater openness, transparency and accuracy have been battered by how it has actually been used and abused" (Lillington, 2017, Para. 1). According to a professor at the University of Maryland, "Fake news stories, the spread of propaganda, secret sponsors behind what we see and read, and hashtag flooding has damaged utopian ideas about the public benefits of the internet" (Lillington, 2017, Para. 1). The internet provides an open platform for everyone, which allows for unmonitored material to be exposed. A study claims that over 60% of adults that read news on social media are consuming and distributing more fake news stories than the most popular mainstream stories (Rosenbaum, 2017). It is necessary to discover whether the news is sponsored material or organic material; therefore, individuals must be attentive and question everything they read, see, or hear. 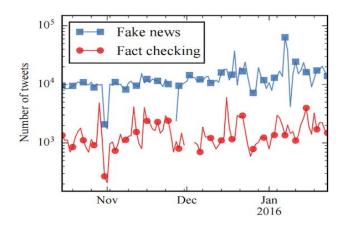

The amount of fake news was high throughout these few months, while showing a significant increase during the month of January. Due to the presidential inauguration taking place, there was a broad emergence of fake news.

Simultaneously, there is a great deal of bias in our media world. According to the Pew Research Center, liberal bias among national press has gone up twenty-two percent since 1995 (Wemple, 2017, Para. 4). This favoritism is a substantial portion of where fake news first originated. Much of the news that we come across today is directed solely at Donald Trump or Hillary Clinton because it is easier to spread untrue information about candidates when there are people to believe it. In addition to increasing the political gap, fake news is prevalent throughout the entire world and is significantly hard to moderate.

Toxic information is being spread like a wildfire. This fake news "epidemic" migrated through most countries involved with the internet and social media, and it needs to be left behind. It is said that public professionals believe that the internet is filled with anger and hate (Rosenbaum, 2017). It's truly disgusting to see websites such as Redditt being viewed so often by the people of this world. This fake news platform is observed by 542 monthly visitors and is named as the eighth most visited website in the world (Rosenbaum, 2017).

While researching, I found that there are solutions like labeling and monitoring sites, as well as being personally active when reading fake news. In relation to this, a source claimed, "Compare what French, Arabic, U.S., and Canadian news are reporting on sensitive topics, such

as terrorism. Read between the lines" (Fahmy, 2017, Para. 20). Because each one is different, this is an effective way to find out if a country is spreading fake news.

Oppositely, some may think that fake news is actually a positive thing. Those are the ones who are producing and distributing false information left and right. These people may include reporters, writers, editors, anchors, journalists, ultra rightists or leftists, famous people, or even the average social media user.
